CADET LINE OF HENRY NEWBURGH 1ST EARL OF WARWICK AT LULWORTH DORSET VIA ROBERT 3RD SON GENERATIONS TO 16TH CENTURY

I. ROBERT NEWBURGH d. 1185 PATRIARCH OF DORSET CADET LINE –

3rd son of Henry de Novo Burgo Earl of Warwick

m. Godeheld de Toeny.

Robert was Lord of Newburgh, Seneschal and Justice of Normandy. His offices were conferred upon him by William II. This Robert was the Lord of East Lulworth, Dorset. His descendants were in possession of many manors, some which endured until 1515 when the Newburgh dynasty became extinct. Robert was also known as “le Bossu” (hunchback) he died as a monk, shorn just months before his death at the Abbey of Bec. He never lived in England. EARLY WOLLASTON NORTHAMPTONSHIRE

Robert de Newburgh (Seneschal and Justice of Normandy) held Wollaston Northamptonshire during the 12th century and he granted Wollaston to Bindon Abbey in Dorset. [BHO](#)

II. ROGER NEWBURGH d. 1194, [[History of Somerset Vol. 6](#)]

m. Maude /Matilda de Glastonia 1161. [Sanders, p. 72, n. 10]

Re-founded Bindon Abbey at Wool. Matilda was granddaughter of Wm. Glastonia and Matilda Arundel. Wm. Glastonia was a Norman and held the Office Chamberlain in the Royal Household in 1130.

In 1290 Henry gave to his brother Thomas “*for his homage and service, the entire messuage and curtilage in the township of Winfrod, which Robert de Stane formerly held and that virgate of land with one acre of pasture and with all its appurtenances which John Harang held at some time [within the manor] of Winfrod.*” D/WLC/T181

Robert III was known to have had his seat at St. Andrew in 1233. [\[Bindon Abbey Charter\]](#). He held land in Somerset and Dorset, Writ 10 June 30 Hen. III, heir 23 years, Sureveton manor and Hurdecote manor Somerset, Wifrot/Winfrod and Almere manor, Dorset [\(C. Hen. III. File 4, \(15.\)\)](#)

V. HENRY NEWBURGH b. 1222, living 1279 d. before 1290

Married twice:

m. Alice ____

(1290) A memorandum summarizing three petitions concerning the Queen:1) Robert Baynyard and William [Baynyard], his brother request a certain piece of land which is in the Queen's hands ;2) John de Neuburg requests grace in the matter of a third of the manor of Winfrith Newburgh and of the manor of Hurcot, of which he has been disseised by the Queen's bailiffs;3) Alice, widow of Henry de Neuburg, requests 10 marks from the manor of Hurcot. Henry mentioned his “natural son” Hugh Pinoch (illegitimate) in his 1290 Deed of Gift. (D/WLC/T181)

VI. JOHN NEWBURGH (I) b. 1250, d. 1308/9

1. **A POSSIBLE SON WAS**

JOHN who was knighted 22 May 1306 (Shaw, [Knights of England](#), 144) presumed deceased, and his heir was Robert.

2. **ROBERT IV** b. 1280

3. **NICHOLAS** proven in a plea of covenant between Robert IV and Nicholas “his brother.”

4. **RICHARD** (possible brother) was involved with Robert in sacking Bindon Abbey.

Problems with land holdings from the time of the Lancaster Rebellion. Eliz. attempted to recoup her dower rights to Winfrith and others in 1322. [SC 8/32/1568](#) seeks grace in the matter of 1/3 of Winfrith and Hurcot, Som. [SC 8/321/E453](#), writs of seisen [SC 8/1/1](#).

VII. ROBERT NEWBURGH (IV) b. 1280, d. 1337

ward of Richard de Sancto Walerico Patent Rolls 1307-1313 arms shown that he was at the second Dunstable tournament bearing the bendy of six, or and azure, engrailed bordure. ([Foster](#), 148)

m. Margaret/Mary de Sancto Walerico

SONS:

1. ? **ROBERT** knighted at capitulation of Calais in 1348. ([Foster](#), 148) poss. bro. of Thomas *arms shown as bendy of six, or and azure, engrailed bordure*. This makes sense, as several previous patriarchs were named Robert.
2. **THOMAS** chevalier heir of Winfrith Newburgh and Horsyth ([Risdon](#), 307)

3. **AMBROSE** possible son of Robert Newburgh was auditor in household of the Edward III from 1333 until he d. 1345. Ambrose served Thomas, Earl of Norfolk and Marshal of England who gave him the office of the Marshalsea, and confirmed by the King. [PRO E101/369/13](#), [SC 8/263/13124](#). Ambrose served under Roger Mortimer when he was the de facto ruler of England. Ambrose served with Nicholas Acton (Iron Acton) in the Scottish and French Wars. Ambrose may have had a son an heir also named Ambrose who was collecting taxes for the king 1348 and died 1473, holding a tenement in London and bequeathing it to the prior and convent of Bustlesham Mountagu. VIII. SIR THOMAS NEWBURGH b. 1315 d. 11 May 1365 Fine Rolls Vol. 7, 332

m. Hawise Umfraville daughter of Gilbert Umfraville and Alianor de Penmark

Thomas illegally alienated land, as recorded by the exchequer 14 July 1375. Close Rolls

Nicholas Poyntz illegally acquired Winfrith in fee from Hawisa in 1365. She recovered the manor. Risdon, 316

IX. SIR JOHN NEWBURGH b. 1340 d. 5 June 1380/81

m. Margaret Poyntz daughter of Nicholas Poyntz who m. Eva de Stokes Plea Rolls

SON:

1. **John Newburgh**

Sir John died leaving his heir **John** as ward of King, John's mother and grandmother (Hawise) helped him gain Winfrith at his majority. Sir John's widow Margaret remarried William Payne as her second husband and lived at Lulworth St.

Andrews. Gilbert Newburgh, John's brother married Avice Poyntz Barry (sister to Margaret) as her second husband.

X. SIR JOHN NEWBURGH MP b. 1370, Lord of E. Lulworth, d. 20 March 1443, Il Abbas, Somerset, buried Bindon, Abbey C 139/116/44

1ST MARRIAGE :

m. **EDITH ATTEMORE** dau. **ROBERT AND ALICE ATTEMORE**

b. 1403, m. 15 April 1422 (Hutchins) d. c. 1447/48 E. Lulworth no will Dorset Records, Fry, 370-71

Edith's children were the heirs to their grandmother Joan Syward Attemore C 139/23/29; C 139/79/6

Some historians believe Joan Syward Attemore, may have been Alice Attemore's sister.

EDITH'S SONS WERE DENIED THEIR PATRIMONY at E. LULWORTH

This occurred when the Esquire's fourth son (son of Alice) was killed at Tewkesbury 1471, John Newburgh drew up charters beginning Sept. 1471, moving all his wealth to his feofees to be given to his second wife's descendants as his heirs. these are detailed in Alice's grandson's John Sen.'s IPM. He died shortly after the Esquire 11 October 1485. C 142-1-41; C142-1-42. Other docs showing property transfer: D/WLC/T 157; D.1815/56; D.1815/58; D.1815/59, dated 1474-78. Dorset History Centre.

Lost his Lulworth patrimony possibly due to his Yorkist sympathies, loyalty to Edward IV.

2. **ROBERT NEWBURGH** Disappears from Dorset after 1449 (Dorset Records, Fry) Shows up in Isle of Wight later. Untracked

2ND MARRIAGE:

m. **ALICE CARENT WESTBURY** ^{WIDOW} dau. **WILLIAM CARENT AND MARGARET STOURTON**

b. c. 1400, m. 1448/9, d. 4 September 1482 E. Lulworth C 140/84/36 IPM, (Dorset Records, Fry, 371)

All Newburghs were buried at Bindon, Abbey. Tombs and records destroyed at Dissolution; Bindon Abbey dismantled 1539. ALICE'S GRANDSONS, children of her son WILLIAM NEWBURGH, became HEIRS of East Lulworth via charter instruments initiated by John Newburgh, Esquire in 1471 PROB 11/7/237; C 142/1/41; C142/1/42; C 142/1/43

Alice Carent was sole heir of lands left to her by her first husband JOHN WESTBURY. C 140/84/36

She had a son William Westbury who died under the illegal wardship of his uncle, Nicholas Carent, dean of the Cathedral of Wells, on the eve of St. James the Apostle, 24 July 1453. Calendar of Close Rolls Vol. VI, Henry VI – 1454-1461, 326. Alice Carent Westbury had ties to royalty.¹

¹ Sir John Stourton was an M.P. and became treasurer of the King's household about 1447. Alice Carent's mother, **MARGARET** was daughter of William Stourton, Esq. and Elizabeth Moigne. Her grandfather Sir John Stourton married Katherine Beaumont (Beaumont/Newburgh line). Sir William Stourton's half-sister Edith Stourton married Sir John Beauchamp. Their daughter, also named Margaret, married John Beaufort, Duke of Somerset. Their daughter was **LADY MARGARET BEAUFORT**, first wife of Edmund Tudor. She was mother of **KING HENRY VII**, and grandmother of **HENRY VIII**. [1] She was also cousin to King Henry VI.

The Beaufort Plantagenets descended from Edward III. There were two houses of the Plantagenets, one was the House of York, and the other was the House of Lancaster. Lancaster claimed the direct line from Edward III by his son John of Gaunt. The War of the Roses was fought between these rival factions of the royal family for control of the Crown.

2. ROGER NEWBURGH Heir to **brother John Newburgh Sen.** also grandson of John Newburgh

d. 1515 leaving E. Lulworth to his daughter Christian who married Sir John Marney

According to his mother's IPM in 1492, Roger was 28 years old. Christian Marney

pre-deceased her husband John, leaving two young daughters Catherine and Elizabeth

who became wards of Thomas Howard 3rd Duke of Norfolk.

3. WILLIAM NEWBURGH died young?

4. JOHN NEWBURGH "the younger" successor at Lullingstone Castle, Kent in 1481.
